

musings from the left shoulder

Ah, as we turn to February our hearts and minds often turn our focus to -- LOVE. I attribute that to a quasi-holiday that occurs at the middle of the month. Like many holiday-ish traditions we are inundated with marketing urging us to purchase items and/or have celebrations related to romance. Whilst I am not one who wants to crush romantic love (*eros*), I feel it gets blown way out of proportion to its importance in our lives.

We have other definitions of LOVE, which are just as – if not more than – significant -- such as the LOVE (*philios*) we might have for family and friends, those whom we 'like.' Probably the most valuable form of LOVE (*agape*) is that which God gives to us, and that Jesus calls us to have for one another: unconditional, sacrificial. Probably the most evident example of this in our society is from first responders, but we are all capable of offering agape love.

My dismay is that today's loud, strident voices focus far more on philios-love and are corrupting that to apply only to those who are like oneself, claiming that all others are to be ostracized and ridiculed, blamed for the ills and problems in society. This is blatantly the opposite of Christ's call to philios-love and, especially, agape-love which places others before oneself.

At the post-inauguration prayer service the Episcopal Bishop of Washington addressed the loudest, most strident voice, exhorting agape-love. She pleaded that we need to work for unity which is based on the biblical foundations of dignity, honesty and humility. She asked for mercy on those who now live in fear. The response was anything but love and mercy. Instead, the reactions were ridicule and criticism, and even death threats.

LOVE is what Jesus calls us to share. When faced with hatred, respond with love and forgiveness. When encountering those filled with fear, respond with love and compassion. When falsehoods arise, respond with love and enlightenment. When experiencing injustice, respond with love and kindness. When hearts are hurting, respond with love and patience. Respond first with LOVE.

We are trying a new offering method. Each family will receive a numbered offering envelope box, allowing our counters and treasurer to easily identify weekly giving.


Please pick up your box in the Narthex or contact the office or Mary Moran. Thank you for helping to make bookkeeping easier each week!

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Esther's Epistle

Dear Friends.

At our Annual Parish Meeting on January 26, it was my pleasure to make a report to the congregation. Making an annual report at this meeting is one of the canonical responsibilities of a parish priest, and it is a task I sincerely enjoy! At the meeting I described my commitment to walking with all of you in the light of the new year. I often comment on sunshine streaming through the windows of our church nave on a Sunday morning. The sunshine energizes me and I can perceive the way sunshine energizes many of you. Even on those mornings when it is raining or cloudy, however, I believe that we are called to look for sunshine – in the glow of friendships, in the spark of hope that scripture offers, and in the way the Holy Spirit inspires us to be a light. I believe that more than at any other time in history, Christians are called to walk in the light of God's love toward a bright future.

Especially now, as we enter 2025, walking as children of the light will not be easy for any of us. Many of us feel discouraged and anxious. We are aware of the dark forces at work in this nation and in our world. We are tempted to "go to a dark place." Some people are tempted to talk about getting even. Some are pulling inward, saying that they are "giving up" on people and faith. Of course, I often feel disappointed by the twists and turns of life. That is why I ask you to return with me to our baptismal promises as together we renounce the spiritual forces of evil and agree to put our whole trust in God's grace and love. This

year, I pray that we will put our whole trust in God and walk in the light, as a congregation.

I believe that we are starting from a good place! In my view, 2024 was a successful "building year" for St. Aidan's. We invested in our church with significant improvements to the physical plant. We also decided to move funds from our investments to "outreach" as we prepare to invest in activity that takes us beyond our own concerns. We raised funds for the church that will be used for "in reach" and will strengthen our community. We launched a spiritual formation program for young people that will lead to confirmation in 2026. We invested time and energy in streamlining our finances and prepared the church to set ministry priorities. We continue to maintain connections in the Hartford community and among our ecumenical church partners.

In 2025, I pray that we will discern a path toward the future as we spend time with one another and as we consider how we can share the message of God's love in new ways. To help us discern, I would like us to engage with one another at an all-parish retreat. I would also like us to consider taking on one new parish project. We are the church, and we are at our best when we illuminate one another's gifts, when we pause to see that we share a common purpose, and when we are walking in the light of God's grace and love. I am confident that in 2025 we will see a clear path that God has prepared for us and we will walk together, in hope and with joy!

I have a lot of canna lilies from Pete's garden. I have never grown them before so they should be a new adventure. In the meantime, I clean closets, sorting out things for the rummage sale, do my German class homework at the last minute (some things never change), and try to think of something new to make for dinner. We have also been sorting old photos. Have I mentioned this before? It is a good winter job, and I hold out hope that we can get it done before spring. Maybe. In the meantime, I sort recipes as well, and that is where this one comes from. It happens to be gluten free, but the test kitchen (my sister Ann) says it works fine with an orange and a lemon and substituting part regular flour if you don't have enough almond flour. Orange Almond Cake

2 oranges

Seed, chop everything (including the peel) into chunks and blend into a pulp

6 eggs

2 3/4 cups almond flour

1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder Stir everything together and pour into a greased 9" springform pan. Bake at 350* 50 to 60 minutes.
