Dear Friends,

Many of us appreciate the prayer said at the close of the late evening service in our Episcopal *Book of Common Prayer*. We pray, "Be present, O merciful God, and protect us through the hours of this night, so that we who are wearied by the changes and the chances of this life may rest in your eternal changelessness." These words from Compline continue to resonate because they speak to our desire for the familiar in an ever-changing world.

Every Sunday, we say words, sing melodies, and perform sacred actions that are familiar and bring us strength. Throughout the service, we are reminded that God loves us and that God's love is changeless. Also comforting is that the Episcopal Church emphasizes liturgy as the heart of Christian life. Foundational to this emphasis is the provision that we may use "other forms set forth by authority within this Church" (BCP, p. 13). Through prayerful consideration and great care, churches are permitted to use certain liturgies that bring new possibilities for encountering God.

Again, this year, during the first part of the Pentecost season, our congregation will worship using the Episcopal Church's resource called *Enriching Our Worship* and we will offer several prayers from the *New Zealand Prayer Book*, a resource that comes to us from one of the many churches within the worldwide Anglican Communion. The service music and hymns are diverse selections brought to us by our Music Director, Pat Gardner. During these Sundays, I hope you find the shape of our liturgy meaningful, experiencing its beauty and solemnity in a new way. In this season of Pentecost, let us open ourselves to opportunities for holy formation and transformation. Come Holy Spirit, come!

At least, that's what I found, though I did not compare data with Eric Wetzel, who was on the southbound side of the same stretch.



He must get tired of watching my to-ing and fro-ing in and around the house. Laundry to the washer. Books to the table by my chair. Garbage to the bin. Dog out. Laundry to the dryer. Dog in. Etc.

Interestingly enough, when we were first married, many, many years ago, I was the one who was never ready on time, who forgot the laundry in the dryer, who let the dishes sit in the sink, and Bruce was the one waiting impatiently for me to find my purse. Crockpot Roasted Chicken

- 3 t, salt
- 2 t. paprika
- 1 t. cayenne pepper
- 1 t. onion powder
- 1 t. thyme
- 1/2 t. garlic powder
- 1/2 t. pepper

On the Road with St. Aidan's -

It was an offer too good to refuse! Free housing and free parking for the NFL draft in Green Bay, held at the end of April.

This amazing offer came courtesy of our two Marys – Mary Z and Mary L. Mary Z had the house in De Pere, just a short drive from historic Lambeau Field and was away on a trip to Southeast Asia. Mary L had the primo parking in her driveway three blocks away from the stadium.

So it happened that Mike Weber, Brian Schrunk, his friend Jay Malek, and I were able to take in a bit of Wisconsin sports history. Mike and I drove up on Thursday morning to get the party started and found our parking place. We figured we were fortunate when we saw the \$100 parking signs at all the other driveways in Mary L's neighborhood.

One of the neat things was the way the Packers incorporated Lambeau Field and the indoor atrium, giving fans a place to shelter from the rain and the cool weather.



The draft is part rock concert, part fashion show, part fun and games for kids and families. And then there's the business of finding a few gems in the draft, something the Packers were trying to do, starting with their 23rd overall pick.

Matthew Golden, the talented wide receiver from Texas, showed up wearing a snakeskin-colored suit and was cheered wildly by Packer fans at the stadium red carpet event on Thursday afternoon. It was clear they were hoping Green Bay would select him with its first-round pick later that night. The Green and Gold indeed selected Golden, the first time the Packers had chosen a wide receiver in the first round since 2002.

A few hours later, Mike and I looked with wonder from the atrium railing as more than 200,000 people filled the space in front of the draft theater. No way we could stand in that mosh pit for four hours or more. So, we headed west into the Titletown district and found a smaller stage with a color screen and watched the first-round picks in relative comfort. We even met the two Canadian guys who built the stage. We had a two-hour wait for dinner next door but eventually were seated and finished the night there.

Brian and Jay arrived late Thursday and had a full experience on Day 2 of the draft. Jay wore his Dan Marino jersey (yes, he is a Dolphins fan from Dubuque, Iowa) and Brian had his Raiders shirt underneath his jacket. Mary L said it was all OK as long as no one was wearing any Chicago Bears' attire.

It poured during the afternoon, so we settled in at the 1919 Kitchen & Tap, the pub-restaurant inside the atrium. Brian and Jay later tried to join the huge crowd but never made it too far, and after freezing for a while we retreated to Hinterland to watch most of the second and third rounds.



A drone show ended the night with cool renderings of Vince Lombardi, a bicycle (the kind kids lend to the Packer players during training camp), the Packer G logo and quarterback Jordan Love. Beer drinking was a requirement at this event.

A good source told me the Green Bay crowd drank more beer the first night than was consumed in all three days at last year's draft in Detroit. Of course, these fans did – this is Wisconsin, after all.

Next year the draft will be in Pittsburgh and the following year on the National Mall in Washington. D.C. The NFL has hit on a winning formula, moving it from city to city and celebrating the tradition of its franchises. One thing is

certain. It won't be in Green Bay again in our lifetimes.

Yes, we're glad we took up the kind offers of our friends and went to Titletown. And here's hoping that first-round pick will be a Golden ticket.
