Welcome to May in the church! This is the time of the year when the flowers bloom and many of us seem to "wake up!" We open our eyes, perceive the sweetness of new life, and we might just decide to adopt a new perspective. The month of May, in the church is a time when Christians are called to "wake up," to pay attention, and listen to people share their experience of God.

The season of Easter concludes on Sunday, May 12. On this Mother's Day, we honor and listen to those who love us in creative and empowering ways. We are called to pay attention to the way the Holy Spirit moves in and through family bonds and other relationships. Then, on May 19, we turn our attention to the way the Holy Spirit is involved in the life of the church. On this Day of Pentecost, we bring into the church beautiful red vestments and linens that are adorned with images of flames. These eye-catching hand-made liturgical pieces, get our attention and remind us that the Holy Spirit is a work among us. We read the story from the Acts of the Apostles about the way the disciples are filled with the Holy Spirit, and they speak about their experience of God in their own way, in their own language. The great part of the story is that people in the "audience" perk up their ears! The people in the audience hear a testimony of "God experiences" from each disciple, and in a way they can understand.

The story of Pentecost is the story of the church! We are all called, throughout the year, to "wake up," to pay attention, to listen – as people share their experience of God and to learn

from them. It is a great and amazing thing that the Holy Spirit offers understanding. We must, however, decide that we will receive this holy gift. On Saturday, May 11, St. Aidan's Vestry gathers in retreat to pray and discuss the life of this congregation. Our goal is to intentionally receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and listen to one another as we consider the way we are one, as the body of Christ. Our work involves learning from a timeline that we



will construct and that represents the congregation. Our perceptions and ideas will then be communicated with the entire congregation, as together, we all prepare for the next years.

Spring is a special time for the church, and especially for this congregation. Let us remain inspired by God's promise and the ancient words of Joel: "I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy." Let us honor and appreciate the people who share their experience of God's love with us. Let us listen with a lively sense of curiosity and openness to the Holy Spirit as we discern our future together, the <u>one body of Christ</u>.

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From Donna's Desk —

Remember the idiom that when something bad happens other bad things usually happen at the same time - *When it rains*, *it pours*. Not only did one furnace fail in early March, the second furnace failed two weeks ago with the third ready to fail.

Eric Wetzel and I were at church for an annual alarm panel inspection when we smelled the same order as when the first furnace failed. The Thielmann Group did an assessment: the new furnace was fine; of the remaining two, the heat exchanger had failed on one, and the other could fail at any time. The Vestry decided to replace the remaining two furnaces. Both furnaces were replaced on Thursday (yes, amid all of the rummage sale set up). It was \$11,148.00 to replace the remaining two furnaces. We are fortunate that we can pay for the furnaces from the operating budget and the 'emergency' money market fund. We will not need to use money from the Endowment Fund. We received \$2,100 from a class action lawsuit against the heat exchanger warranty and will receive \$810 from Focus on Energy rebates for the Energy Star furnaces we installed.

We also encountered another problem this week with the fire protection sprinkler system. While setting up for the rummage sale we noticed that the compressor in the utility room was running several times an hour. "It is not supposed to do that." . After three visits, Ahern found a small pinhole leak in a pipe above the hallway and a larger leak in a pipe above the pantry area and repaired them. They checked and replaced the AMD (Air maintenance device) valves. All is now working as intended. So far it has been good.

Outreach – We received a \$2,000 grant to upgrade our technology systems. Equipment purchased during Covid provided a reliable digital presence for St. Aidan's so we could be keep connected to our church family and the greater Hartford Community. Fast forward three+ years. We now have an online presence that averages 25 viewers every week. We have received feedback that audio is not always clear and the camera needs to be adjusted with movement. We had many problems with Facebook live so opted to discontinue livestreaming. Each week we 'welcome' 25 viewers to St. Aidan's. The fact that we continue to serve 25+ viewers each week is a testament to our outreach ministry. Do we communicate a vibrant, mission-focused gathering? Do we communicate an authentic sense of belonging and loving faith community? If the audio is hard to hear or the camera is too distant, outreach to people online is compromised. The grant will be used to purchase Recording/livestream technology (Camera, Monitor, Cables, and Ambient microphone (RODE); and an Office Computer System. This update would more efficiently send out our online newsletter, upload recorded services, and edit our church website. The current computer is very slow and the technology/software is outdated. Online ministries build a new outreach community, which includes our homebound members as well as non-members. A recent survey, Steps to Increase Young Adult Engagement, posted on ECF website, showed that 42% of those responding to the survey feel enhancing a congregation's social media presence is an important step in moving forward to engage young adults as well. We need to learn how an online presence 'fits' others' needs and 'fits' our mission, and how both online and in person worship intersect. "Where flowers bloom so does hope." [Lady Bird Johnson]

Support for the St. Aidan's Little Pantry

– an excerpt from a note that was left: "...we are so blessed to have the pantry your church provides off Monroe Ave. It has helped us have a meal a couple times...and we would like to thank your church for providing this for us." This note reminds me how profound this outreach to the community is - whether we supply the pantry with a jar of peanut butter, a box of cereal, rice dishes, or mac and cheese, our gifts impact many in the community.

HUMBLE PIE. 475* 12-15 minutes

1 pie crust

Nestle into a pie plate or on a piece of parchment paper on a cookie sheet.

2-3 C. of fruit cut in chunks, peeled if you like.

1/4 to 1/3 C. sugar* (this will depend on how sweet your fruit is)

1 T. cornstarch

*Reserve a little sugar to sprinkle on the pie later. Mix the rest with the fruit and cornstarch.

Mound the fruit in the middle of the crust and fold the edges toward the middle.

1 egg

Beat the egg and brush on the piecrust. Sprinkle with some sugar and bake in a preheated oven at 475* for 12-15 minutes.

United Thank Offering: Over \$1M awarded for projects welcoming 'the stranger'

The Episcopal Church Executive Council approved more than \$1 million in United Thank Offering grants supporting 20 innovative mission and ministry projects during its April meeting.

The funds come from the United Thank Offering's yearly Ingathering, which includes monies collected in "blue boxes" at Episcopal churches, designated as thank offerings. This year's total includes a special matching challenge grant to raise funds for the ministries of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East.

This is the second of a three-year United Thank Offering grant focus on Matthew 25. This year's grants fund projects that explore new,

meaningful ways to welcome people with differences that cause isolation, as well as projects that encourage truth-telling, acknowledging historic trauma, and establishing a path toward healing. The 2023 grants supported projects related to the worldwide incarceration crisis.

Those who are just: quite a few at thirty-five.


