Dear Friends.

The leaves on the trees in my yard are changing and the walnuts are falling onto my house with a "thud!" Such is autumn in Wisconsin. Every year at this time, I feel that the days are passing awfully fast. It seems that every week is full of church and family activity. Perceiving the passing of the year can bring me down, yet I realized that I share this sense of fleeting time with people from time immemorial. Since antiquity people have observed the cycles of the moon, kept various types of calendars, marked annual events and chronicled their history with the names of their rulers. In 2025, we do this too; however, we also have access to data and multiple viewpoints of the truth. Perhaps technology has changed our perception of time, yet I wonder if we have more time than we think.

This October, I ask that you deliberately slow down, with me. While we can't stop time, we can ask God to abide with us and put away our many clocks as we pray. I think we will find that spending time in prayer affords us the opportunity to experience "time out of time" and a precious type of calm. Through prayer, we can adjust our thinking and we'll find that we are able to focus on a divine calendar. Remember that God's time is not our time, that God is constantly at work in the world.

This prayer is found on page 815 in our Book of Common Prayer. It shifts the focus away from the swirl of our needs. It reminds us of the way God cares deeply for us and for our future. During the month of October, I hope you will pray these words with me:

"O God, you made us in your own image and redeemed us through Jesus your Son: Look with compassion on the whole human family; take away the arrogance and hatred which infect our hearts; break down the walls that separate us; unite us in bonds of love; and work through our struggle and confusion to accomplish your purposes on earth; that, in your good time, all nations and races may serve you in harmony around your heavenly throne; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Time to start fresh with the essentials, a new start. So, when fall comes around I start sorting. If I haven't used it in the last year, it's time to go. Well, except for the art supplies and maybe the cookbooks......and the yarn. Maybe I am not as good at this as I thought. Here is a quick soup to nourish you after all that sorting.

Italian Penicillin Soup

Olive oil

I onion chopped

Garlic chopped

2 carrots chopped

2 stalks celery chopped

Sauté together with:

1 teaspoon Italian herbs (oregano, basil, thyme)
Add in:

6 cups chicken broth

1 cup small pasta or Raman noodles

1 Tablespoon lemon juice

Simmer until pasta is tender and top with Parmesan cheese.

Extras if you have them:

Shredded chicken, spinach, kale or mushrooms.... You get the idea.







ECW Outreach


The time, talents and treasures of St. Aidan's ECW focuses on improving the lives of parish members and their communities through InReach, Outreach, and spiritual Growth. **Inreach** supports our own St. Aidan's church. This includes our time, talent, and treasure used to support the operational budget or nonoperational budget. At the February 2025 meeting, the ECW transferred \$7,962.17 from the Christmas Bazaar fund raising to St. Aidan's operating fund. It was used to support the capital improvements made in 2024. **Outreach** supports anything that is given outside the church, including time and talent, and fundraising that supports financial donations.

Special donations were made to:



\$1,000 to St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Altadena, CA, to help them rebuild. St. Mark's was tragically destroyed by the Eaton Fire, January 2025. In our diocese, Church of the Holy Communion, Lake Geneva, held a free-will donation fund raising event, Candlelight Classical Concert, to support the rebuilding of St. Mark's Episcopal Church. It was a total loss.

\$1000 to Watts of Love: Watts of Love, is a global nonprofit, founded by Nancy Economou in 2012. Watts of Love provides solar lights and financial literacy education to thousands of families across Africa, Asia, Latin American and the Philippines.



One of many examples: Malawi. It is 8 p.m., and the darkness has enveloped Tiyamike's house in western Malawi. However, a bright light illuminates as the sounds from a manual sewing machine drift out. The 29-year-old's life changed when she received a small solar torch as a gift from the American non-profit Watts of Love. As a tailor, she now sews into the night, doubling her productivity and profits. She so works overtime to complete bulk orders and meet deadlines.

Before she had the torch, she would abandon work at sunset. Since receiving the torch, she works until late and produces more clothes. Her revenue has almost doubled in the past year. "On behalf of all of us at Watts of Love, I'd like to express our heartfelt appreciation for the generous donation of \$1,000. Your support is changing lives by providing families with the tools, knowledge, and confidence to break free from the cycle of poverty." - Mary Bart, Watt of Love, Director.

<u>\$250 to Interfaith Caregivers:</u> This non-profit volunteer organization provides free service to adults 60 and over. Services include transportation to doctors' appointments, to the grocery store, help at home, yard clean up, snow removal and home visits. They also have medical equipment such as walkers to



loan. The goal is to provide financial support for two offices in Hartford and West Bend: salaries, vehicle maintenance for their cars and vans.

\$1000 to Episcopal Relief: earmarked for Ukraine. The goal is to aid humanitarian efforts for the people of Ukraine. An online donation through Episcopal Relief and Development is r equested.


