rom The For many of us, the words "Lent," "Holy Week,"

and "Easter" remind us of familiar themes and

meaningful events in our lives; however, for some indi-

viduals the experiences related to these words would benefit from some context. We know that penitence is a Lenten theme and our tradition encourages us to observe "a holy Lent" in prayer, fasting, and self-denial. During the weeks of Lent at St. Aidan's, we will explore how these practices shape our understanding of Christian history, engagement with our faith, and our spiritual development. What is not so clear is that this time in the church year also includes the theme of renewal. Penitence and renewal prepare us to participate in the great joy of the Easter celebration.

This is actually a season of "preparation for participation!" As we explore the contours of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we prepare ourselves to both affirm our faith and demonstrate our commitment to it. Every year, our journey through Lent, Holy Week, and Easter should be both educational and inspiring. Learning about our faith tradition and exploring spiritual practices can bring a deeper level of spiritual understanding leading to confident renewal of our baptismal vows. Then on Easter day, we will pray, "You bid your faithful people cleanse our hearts, and prepare with joy for the Pascal feast; that fervent in prayer and works of mercy, and renewed by your Word and Sacraments, we may come to the fullness of grace which you have prepared for those who love you."

I hope you will join me in worship for the five Wednesday evening online services in Lent, "Practice Shapes Believing," for our Zoom Seder Dinner on Maundy Thursday, a Tenebrae Good Friday service, and the great celebration of Easter.

Seed cake is mentioned in the first gathering of the dwarves, along with a lot of other food! Caraway in a pound cake is not something I would normally, do but it is surprisingly good! I hope you enjoy it, or if you have limited your sweets for Lent, it freezes well. You can also bake it in cupcakes. Enjoy in the afternoon with a little tea and a good book!

Bilbo's Seed Cake.

One loaf or 12 cupcakes

1 C. butter

1 C. sugar

Cream these together.

3 eggs

Add one at a time, beating well.

2 C. flour

1 T. caraway seeds

1/4 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

1 tsp baking powder

Stir together, and add half to the creamed mixture.

1/4 C. brandy (or lemon or orange juice)
Add to the mixture with the last half of the flour mixture.

Pour into a greased loaf pan, or muffin tin.

Raw sugar or cinnamon sugar

Sprinkle generously over the top of the batter. Bake at 350* until the top is a nice toasty brown, about an hour for the loaf cake and 25-35 minutes for the smaller cakes. Enjoy and remember the Sundays during Lent are not fasting days!

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<u>Annual Meeting</u> Report – a re-cap

St. Aidan's closed one week after the vestry approved my role as senior warden. Little did I know that I would literally be helping to lead and support St. Aidan's down an

untraveled road -- with all the bumps and bruises of that road! Today, I feel the church is in good order. We have a new priest and a new secretary, a vestry that is willing to give of its time, busy ECW members who are always looking for the next thing to do to bring us together, welcoming members when I call for a chat, many who are receptive/attending the driveway Eucharist service, many views for online worship/compline; over 50% are reading (or opening) the ENews and *Stag &Staff*, and as of last week 85% of our proposed budget has been pledged.

When St. Aidan's closed its doors after the March 15 service, the vestry focused on:

- What would worship look like? On line services were new to us, so we had to scramble to learn new technology. Thanks to Brian Schrunk, Mike Weber, and Scott Eakins, we are able to provide online services and meetings through Zoom connections and Facebook; Morning Prayer and zoom driveway service, Evening Prayer/Compline/ Special services, such as Advent on Wednesday, Worship Center for the children through Zoom on Sunday. Scott Eakins and Pat Gardner provide music as part of morning worship and special Wednesday night services.
- How would pastoral care be met? The vestry members and interested parish members are making weekly calls/email contacts/sending cards to parish members. Personally, I have found this to be a wonderful way to re-connect with the parish or to connect and make new friendships.
- How would we manage finances with an empty church? I was encouraged to learn that St. Aidan's is working on several of the same strategies as other churches throughout the country. We encourage online giving and mail self-addressed stamped envelopes for those who prefer an alternative payment method. This has been successful. We applied for and received money through the Payroll Protection Plan.

In addition, we continued with work that needed to be done. Such as:

• Weekly monitoring of all systems, following CDC guidelines for re-opening. Things such as running water through all faucets, flushing toilets, checking and operating heating and air conditioning systems; checking the stove, emergency exit signs and lighting for proper operation were done. Routine cleaning, sanitizing, and shampooing the carpets has also been done. Thank you to Brian and Louise Schrunk.

- ◆ The worship committee plans and provides online, pre-recorded Sunday worship.
- Rotation of lay persons is again established to read the lessons. If you are interested contact Micki Hoffmann or Pastor Esther.
- Diocesan approved grants that were submitted/ approved allowed us to purchase recording and sound equipment; Zoom licenses, etc.
- A new website was launched in late August and continues to be edited/revised. Thank you to Mike Weber, Gary Stage, Eileen Schmidt, and Brian Schrunk.
- BREEZE has been updated and synced with Mailchimp. Thank you to Bruce Pollock, Aimee Henning, and Pastor Esther for their perseverance

We hired a new priest, the Reverend Esther Kramer. Pastor Esther began on October 18 as part-time

rector. A month later we hired Aimee Hennings as parttime administrative assistant.

Pastor Esther, the Worship Committee, and ECW's helping hands, St. Aidan's implemented "St. Aidan's Season of Light," which included the Advent Taizé Service, Advent in a Box, Winter Solstice walk-through, Blue Christmas, Christmas Eve, and Christmas services.

The congregation of St. Aidan's is resilient, adapting well to new situations and changing events. We have always determined what to do next, we bounce back, and take that step forward. Everything changed in 2020. Even the start of 2021 is not a return to a new normal. We are establishing a new base, with a new part-time rector, new secretary, new vestry, and new diocesan leadership; creating a new reality within the COVID environment.

All of what we have done is due to your <u>gifts of time and talent</u> -- supporting online ministries; outreach to parish members; up-keep of gardens/areas around the building; your <u>gift of treasure</u> -- sustaining and guiding our mission; supporting our priest/staff and building; supporting outreach programs for those in need; supporting technology for online services/communications; and your <u>gift of presence</u> -- morning worship/compline, advent services, upcoming lent program/services, Zoom coffee hour, worship center. Soon, when it is safe to return to in-person service, empty pews will be filled again.

I am grateful for all that has been accomplished collectively to maintain and support St. Aidan's during this COVID time. I appreciate your support as we transition with a new priest, office staff, and vestry.

3. Ministry reports. Discussion of ongoing ministries for the year and those that have been put on hold during the Pandemic.


4. Warden's report.



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trange bleak season in the Church year in the part of the world [New York] in which 1 live. But I have a hunch that if I stop being afraid of the Beatitudes and consider them seriously, I may discover a way of life which will not only be simpler, but which will also be more free than life normally is.

LISTENING WITH ALL OUR **HEART**

Listening to Ourselves Reflection By Scott Stoner

When you encounter difficulties and contradictions, do not try to break them, but bend them with gentleness and time.

- Saint Francis de Sales

The Living Compass Model for Well-Being has four quadrants -heart, soul, strength, and mind. Today we will focus on the Heart quadrant, which includes our emotions and relationships.

As a psychotherapist, I commonly meet with people who initially want help in getting rid of uncomfortable emotions, such as fear, sadness, anger, or anxiety. I typically respond that the most important first step is to begin by listening to what those troubling emotions are trying to say. Our emotions function like the warning lights on a car dashboard, letting us know that there is an underlying issue that may need to be explored and addressed.

Just as it is wise to learn to listen to uncomfortable emotions within ourselves, it is also wise to learn to honor and listen to discomfort if or when it arises in an important relationship in our lives. Ignoring uncomfortable feelings rarely helps them to go away. Instead, gently facing discomfort in a relationship, and risking what initially may be an awkward conversation, can be crucial in deepening and improving the relationship.

Because uncomfortable emotions, either within ourselves or in our relationships, are well, uncomfortable, it is understandable that we might want to avoid them. If we do that, though, often we will find that what we resist, persists, and that what we face, with time and care, can be resolved.

Making It Personal: As you listen to what's happening right now with your emotions and/or your relationships, what do you hear? If you are experiencing any discomfort, can you sit with it to see what it has to teach you? What do you think of the idea that "what we resist, persists"?



Book Review -- Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man by Emmanuel Acho

From Amazon: In Uncomfortable Conversations With a Black Man. Emmanuel Acho takes on all the questions, large and small. insensitive and taboo, many white Americans are afraid to ask—yet which all Americans need the answers to, now more than ever. With the same open-hearted generosity that has made his video series a phenomenon, Acho explains the vital core of such fraught concepts as white privilege, cultural appropriation, and "reverse racism." In his own words, he provides a space of compassion and understanding in a discussion that can lack both. He asks only for the reader's curiosity—but along the way, he will galvanize all of us to join the antiracist fight.

Editor's Note: This provocative, but very readable book is available at the Hartford Library. Written as though Acho was sitting at your kitchen table, it's a must-read for these times!
