

Where We're Going from Here!

The past couple weeks I have been 'grappling' with ideas from Thom Rainer's blogs (blog@churchanswers.com) and from the Episcopal Church Foundation (ECF) newsletter links. I would like to share a couple with you.

Easter Is Over... Now What? Thom Rainer, April 10, 2021.

Easter is over..... What do we do now? Profound? A wake-up call? Yes, exactly a feeling I had as I pulled into the church parking lot two weeks ago. To my surprise, Laura and John Johnston were weeding the flower gardens. How uplifting! Yes, Easter is over, but our personal ministries are never over. Thank you, Laura and John for your ministry to keep the gardens of St. Aiden's' inviting. Warmer weather will continue to welcome outside projects; and inside a light replacement project will begin this week, along with more cleaning and sanitizing for safe in-person worship on Sundays. Thank you to Pastors Esther and Loretta, church staff, tech volunteers, readers/acolytes/ushers/altar guild, and vestry for providing worship and music through this uncharted territory. One answer to *now what*? Gratitude.

Another *Now what*? suggested in this blog is that more churches will <u>minister to their communities</u> more than ever before. That can be great news and one we join in as the Vestry works on its goals, particularly, the goal to *Increase contacts and connections with the community by creating a place to belong.* How do we provide a welcome space for others; for groups to meet safely, for observing diverse traditions, for celebrations?

Rainer also suggests to **remember your church's address.** Seriously? Profound? Or another wake-up call? Then, I remembered that Fr. Mike would be quick to add that God gave us this location for a reason, and that it



was not an accident. Our goal to increase connections with the community may mean to walk around our community neighborhoods or to take a fresh look at where St. Aidan's is located and why. Rainer also stresses the importance of investing in each other; writing letters, cards or emails, making phone calls or sending a text.

From ECF, "<u>A church is not only supposed to be in a community, it should be a ministry to the community</u>". Very definitely, we have come to realize the visibility St. Aidan's faith community has to the greater community through online services. In-

deed. It is a complement to the in-person service. An ECF survey indicates it is often a first step for many to come to the in-person services. A hybrid world of digital and in-person worship is emerging, not unlike the hybrid options for state/national conferences, on-line courses, etc. Digital services become a viable option for those not able to physically attend, those who travel, have moved, a child that moves or is in college, etc. In what ways can St. Aidan's continue to provide that access or find out who needs access? Another vestry goal is to *Coordinate "Faith in 3D," to re-gather and welcome each other and new people to church.* How do we integrate worship in person, inside the church or outside and online? This goal addresses gaining greater visibility in the community.

Last, this past week the Wardens in the diocese participated in a Zoom meeting with Bishop Jeffery Lee, Provisional Bishop of the Diocese. From Bishop Lee on the pandemic/masks: there is "*light at the end of the tunnel, but we are still in the tunnel.*" It is important to keep everyone safe -- masks and distancing are still required. As a Vestry, it is necessary to provide adequate ventilation, hand sanitizer, and a clean, sanitized worship environment. We have created guidelines for in-person worship, patio, and/or driveway services. When you want to attend in-person worship, remember to sign up by clicking the link that is provided in the weekly ENews. Currently, our capacity is limited to 35.

The Diocese COVID-19 Risk Assessment Dashboard will be maintained as a resource and service to parishes. However, the frequency of updates will change as things improve, from daily to every other so that ratings and trends can continue to be assessed by county. Bishop Lee's priorities are to reach out and make connections with clergy and parishes – that may be Zoom visitations, outdoor visits; confirmations and receptions.

Even though we may not like it, we have become more receptive to change. I know I have become more patient and determined to make adjustments to meet the needs of the parish.

GOOD NEWS As of April 5th, the vaccines are available for all persons over the age of

16 in Wisconsin and 600 additional sites will open.

Please get the vaccines when you can!

NOT SO GOOD NEWS

Active case rates are going up throughout the area covered by the diocese. We are not out of this yet, so there is CDC guidance for vaccinated persons.

What's Changed

If you've been fully vaccinated:

- You can gather indoors with fully vaccinated people without wearing a mask.
- You can gather indoors with unvaccinated people from one other household (for example, visiting with relatives who all live together) without masks, unless any of those people or anyone they live with has an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.
- If you've been around someone who has COVID-19, you do not need to stay away from others or get tested unless you have symptoms.
- However, if you live in a group setting (like a correctional or detention facility or group home) and are around someone who has COVID-19, you should still stay away from others for 14 days and get tested, even if you don't have symptoms.

What Hasn't Changed

For now, if you've been fully vaccinated:

You should still take steps to protect yourself and others in many situations, like wearing a mask, staying at least 6 feet apart from others, and avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated spaces.

Take these precautions whenever you are in public:

- Gathering with unvaccinated people from more than one other household
- Visiting with an unvaccinated person who is at increased risk of severe illness or death from COVID-19 or who lives with a person at increased risk
- You should still avoid medium or large-sized gatherings.
- You should still delay domestic and international travel. If you do travel, you'll still need to follow CDC requirements and recommendations.
- You should still watch out for symptoms of COVID-19, especially if you've been around someone who is sick. If you have symptoms of COVID-19, you should get tested and stay home and away from others.
- You will still need to follow guidance at your workplace


Dear Friends,

The month of May provides some exciting imagery for the church! In the fifth and sixth weeks of the Easter season, we find in our scripture reading images of Jesus first as the true vine (we are the branches), then as a caring friend, and then as a divine mentor. Come now O God, release our demons Open our eyes to see The shame within, our guilt and pain Mend us, make us whole.


Come now O God, and still our anger Open our minds to peace Embrace our fear, and hold us close Calm the storm within.




Detail from Christ with St. Mary Magdalene at the Tomb Rembrandt, 1638.
